

## **Nebraska Highlights**

- The Lincoln Police Department possesses license plate reader equipment, but has no written policies, procedures, or practices governing the sharing, accessing, and retention of license plate reader data.<sup>1</sup>
- The Omaha Police Department also has no formal, written policies, although their database contains license plate reader photographs taken since mid-2009.<sup>2</sup>
